Nixon's gifts from Mideast

WASHINGTON — Two silver tea services and a mosaic game table inlaid with mother of pearl were among the gifts the President and Mrs. Nixon brought back to the White House from their Middle East trip.

The Nixons presented each of their hosts in the five-nation tour a set of "Winslow Homer" presidential plates, with color reproductions of the master-

works of the artist in the center, and presidential inscriptions in gilt on the reverse side.

The gifts included:

- A silver tea service and a 16th century statue of the ancient Egyptian goddess Mattor, a Cairo archeological find, from Egypt.
- Jeweled decorations from Saudi Arabia.
 - · A Hebrew-English Bible

bound in silver, from Israel.

The game table, two statues that are reproductions of museum pieces, three pieces of brocade fabric, an embroidered caftan robe made of velvet and lined in silk, a gold-plated Damascus steel sword with semi-precious stones, two flower vases made of bronze and another of copper and silver, and an embroidered damask table cloth with 24 matching napkins, from Syria.
