A 'Deep Hurt' For Kalmbach

Herbert W. Kalmbach will go to prison today, carrying what a friend described as a "deep hurt" over President Nixon's apparent displeasure because of Kalmbach's decision to cooperate in the government's prosecution of the Watergate conspiracy.

Since his sentencing on June 17 to a minimum six-month term on two counts of illegal campaign fund solicitations, the 52-year-old former personal lawyer for Mr. Nixon was said to have waited in vain for "some word of sympathy or encouragement from the President or at least an expression of gratitude for his 12 years of unquestioning loyalty."

The Justice Department late Friday ordered Kalmbach to report today to the U.S. Marshal in Baltimore to facilitate his appearance as a witness before the

House Judiciary committee's presidential impeachment hearings opening tomorrow.

After his judiciary committee testimony, Kalmbach expects to be sent to Lompoc Federal Prison Camp in California.

The tall, soft-spoken lawyer who raised nearly \$18 million for Mr. Nixon's two presidential campaigns was said to be less interested in assisting the impeachment hearings than he is in an opportunity to testify against former White House aides John D. Ehrlichman and H. R. Haldeman.

To his Newport Beach friends he has made no secret of his bitterness toward the two former presidential assistants, calling them the "arch-villains of the whole affair" and blaming them for misleading both him and Mr. Nixon.

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
