Mr. Kalmbach was guoted by a friend here as saying that last March 7 before his dis-closure of the Rebozo conver-sation he had received a friendly after-midnight telephone call from the President. But two weeks later, after his testimony about Mr. Rebozo became pub-lic, there was no further word from the President.

Friends here said that the 6-to-18-month sentence came as a complete shock to Mr. Kalm-bach. When he stood before Judge John J.
