## NAACP Takes Moderate Impeachment Stand

The NAACP took a moderate stand yesterday in support of the House Judiciary Committee investigation of charges against President Nixon, although some members favored a position urging impeachment.

The vote by 3000 delegates during the final day of the organization's 65th annual convention endorsed t n e group's board of directors which had stated in January: "Inquiry into the possibility and the process of impeachment must go forward in the House Judiciary Committee in a sober and impartial search for the truth."

In other action, the dele-

gates adopted 26 resolutions, several of which will be in the forefront of the organization's attention in the next year, according to Roy Wilkins, the organization's executive director.

In those resolutions, the membership is urged to push for affirmative action programs in all educational institutions; to seek legislation to revoke licenses of real estate agents and lenders whose practices support a dual market in housing; and in labor the body urges the elimination of discriminatory practices against women in employment, promotion and compensation.
