**Watergate Coverage  
 Believed 'Too Much'**

PRINCETON, N.J. — A majority of Americans, 53 per cent, believe the mass media — newspapers, television and radio — are providing "too much" coverage of Watergate.

Four times as many in the current survey say "too much" as say "too little." Another 3 persons in 10 (30 per cent) believe the coverage of Watergate to be "about right."

The proportion who believe Watergate coverage is in excess has increased from one year ago, when 44 per cent said the media was providing too much coverage, 12 per cent said too little and 36 per cent believed it to be "about right."

Here is the question asked:

*With regard to the Watergate affair, do you think the mass media—that is, newspapers, television and radio—*

*have provided too much coverage, about the right amount, or too little?*

Here are the latest national findings compared with those from the earlier survey:

**Pro-Nixon Letters  
 Flood Lawmaker**

CINCINNATI, July 6 (UPI) —Rep. Charles W. Whalen, (R.-Ohio), says constituent mail has suddenly flip-flopped and is now running 20-1 against impeachment of President Nixon, but he believes it reflects industriousness rather than a trend.

"I don't think the current mail includes anti-Nixon person changing their minds," Whalen said. "It's just the pro-Nixon people who have seen the impeachment inquiry undertaken and are now sounding off."
