A copy of the cable, labeled "confidential" and dated May 25, was obtained by The Washington Post. It was signed by the acting American ambassador in Kuwait, Walter M. Mc-Clelland, and was sent on a rush basis. It refers to Agnew

as a VIP.

It directs the Embassy in Amman, Jordan, to "convey Mr. Agnew's sincere regrets to King and all others con-cerned" and asks the embassy in Jidda, Saudi Arabia, to can cel an appointment Agnew Agnew had with King Faisal.

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The last part of the telegram alerts the embassy in Beirut, Lebanon, to Agnew's imminent arrival. "He requests embassy obtain reservation for him at Phoenicia Hotel and send car and driver to meet him at airport."

Agnew, who resigned last Oct. 10 after pleading no con-test to income tax evasion, has been trying to establish himself as a middleman or broker between foreign governments and American industry, according to informed sources, He notified the State Depart-He notified the State Department last April that he would be travelling on business to Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Iran, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Iran, Judy Agnew, the former Vice President's wife, entered Portugal, Singapore, Korea, Morroco. On April 27, the State Department informed the embassies of all the nations on Agnew's itinerary of his plans, a Department spokesman said. He said that the cable told the embassies that Agnew should be accorded "appropriate courtesies' due any American businessman, but not such honors as an escort, a car or security.

The spokesman said Agnew was informed of the content of the cable.

Austria Inaugurates New President

VIENNA, July 8 (AP)-Rudolf Kirchschlaeger, 59, was , sworn in today as Austria's first non-Socialist president since World War II.

Although he served as foreign minister in the Socialist cabinet of Chancellor Bruno Kreisky and ran for president as the Socialist Party's candidate, Kirchschlaeger is not a member of the party.

He made clear in his inauguration speech that he would follow no party line as head of state—in the presidency—which is mostly ceremonia ceremonial but more powerful than in most Western democracies.

After resigning, Agnew continued to receive Secret Service protection and work out of a government office here. His protection was terminated last February after members of Congress and the General Service Administration com-plained, in some cases saying it was illegal. sources, has been trying to develop his business as a middleman since resigning the vice presidency. He is attempting, these sources said, to capitalize on his entry to the presidential palaces of various foreign governments where he is still viewed with respect and admiration. One person familiar with Agnew's new business described it as a simple attempt to represent American businesses abroad.

Agnew was disbarred as a lawyer in Maryland following his nolo contendere plea to the tax charge and the Justice Department's release of a page document that detailed the charges against him. In it, the government charges that Agnew took kickbacks from Maryland contractors while executive of Baltimore County, governor of Maryland and Vice President. Agnew denied all but the tax charge. He was fined \$10,000 and placed on unsupervised probation.

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
