Mitchell, Parkinson Ask Supreme Court To Disqualify Sirica

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP) —Two defendants in the Wa-tergate cover-up trial asked the Supreme Court today to disqualify United States District Judge John J. Sirica from presiding.

The two former Attorney General John N. Mitchell and Kenneth W. Parkinson, an of-ficial of President Nixon's 1972 re-election campaign, urged the Court to consider the question on an expedited basis.

Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Parkin-son seek review of a decision by the United States Court of Appeals in Washington last month upholding Judge Sirica's refusal to disqualify himself. There was no indication when the Court would act on the petition. The Court has already extended its current term to review an order by Judge Sirica directing Mr. Nix-on to produce hite House tapes and documents for pos-sible use as evidence in the cover-up trial. The court heard arguments on this case yester-day. begin Sept. 9 before Judge Sir-ica. The defendants are r. Mitchell; Mr. Parkinson; H. R. Haldeman, ohn R. Ehrlich-man and Gordon C. Strachan, former White House aides, and Robert C. Mardian, a former Presidential campaign aide. In their petition to the Su-preme Court Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Parkinson contended that Judge Sirica, in the course of supervising a grand jury inves-tigation into the Watergate case, "familiarized himself with much of the evidence involving the defendants."
