16—Sen. Edward J. Gurney (R. Fla.) pleaded innocent today to charges of bribery, conspiracy and lying to a federal grand jury. He was freed on a \$1,000 unsecured bond.

tered a not guilty pleao n each of the charges that evolved from a fund-raising scandal that allegedly netted at least \$233,000 in contributions from builders seeking favors from Gurney through the Federal Housing Administration.
