Press Accused Of Bias

A White House official esterday accused the teleision networks, several rominent newspapers, nagazines and some indiidual newsmen of a liberal ias and said they somemes distort the news gainst President Nixon.

Bruce Herschensohn, depty special assistant to Mr. vixon, specifically attacked BS, NBC, ABC, the New ork Times, the Washington ost and Time and Newsreek magazines, and named BS newsmen Walter Cronite, Dan Rather, Roger fudd, Marvin Kalb and aniel Schorr as examples Ilberal journalists biased gainst the President.

Herschensohn attacked he media in a news confernce — and drew immediate ire from the reporters atending.

"The liberal bias of the ress has gotten to everyone md has even affected me," e said.

Herschensohn insisted the lea of an attack on the ress was entirely his own md he made these specific eccusations:

Former Attorney Genral John N. Mitchell and armer Commerce Secrery Maurice Stans were

"tried and convicted by the leading papers and the networks" to the extent that even he was "shocked" when they were found innocent after their New York trial.

• The press so thoroughly accustomed the American people to believe that the U.S. prisoners of war in Vietnam rejected Mr. Nixon's war policies that he again was "shocked" when the POWs who returned praised the President.

Several of the reporters attending the 45-minute news conference at the Executive Office Building strongly disputed the accu-

sations.

At one point, Herschensohn accused CBS diplomatic correspondent Marvin Kalb of being vague in reporting that high officials were saying that the President was going to Moscow late last month in a weakened position because of the Watergate scandal.

When reporters pointed out that Secretary of State Henry M. Kissinger had insisted that he not be identified as "the high officials" who were being quoted in that statement, Herschensohn quickly offered an apology.
