Agnew, Denial by Republicans Earlier this year, Mr. Gar-rison was the subject of con-troversy when Jack Ander-son, the columnist, reported that the lawyer had been as-signed by Republicans on the committee to "impede the impeachment proceedings." Describing Mr. Garrison as a "tough, partison conserva-tive," the article said, "on paper, he is supposed to play second fiddle to minority counsel Albert Jenner, a dis-tinguished Chicago attorney. but our sources say that Jenner, a dis-tinguished Chicago attorney. He previously served as Con-gressional liaison on the Senate staff of Mr. Agnew. Before that, Mr. Garrison was an associate minority counsel on the House Judi-icary Committee, from 1971 to 1972; the Virginia Com-monwealth's Attorney for Roanoke, 1970 to 1971, and Assistant Commonwealth's attorney, 1966 to 1969.
