Backers End Fast

An estimated 300 to 600 members/ and supporters of the National Prayer and Fast Committee, who had been going without food for three days on the Capitol steps in support of President Nixon, ended their fast yesterday with singing, speeches, cheers

and senators as they consider impeachment.

"The influence of God will make a difference" in the impeachment vote, said committee president Neil Salonen. "I definitely feel this will change the vote,"

More then 100 congressmen addressed the committee over the past three days giving support to the prayers and fasting. The committee heard praise yesterday from its founder, the Rev. Sun Myung Moon, and from Rabbi Baruch Korff, founder of the National Citizens Committee for Fair-

As Salonen brought the fast to an end, committee officials threw fruit into the audience. A messenger bearing a statement from President Nixon, who was in the western White House, brought the crowd to its feet.
