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**Rules Committee  
To Get a Resolution  
Before House Does**

WASHINGTON, July 26 (UPI)—Any impeachment resolution voted by the House Judiciary Committee will be sent to still another committee before facing an estimated two weeks of House debate and voting, House sources said today.

Speaker Carl Albert and the Judiciary Committee chairman, Representative Peter W. Rodino Jr. Democrat of New Jersey, have decided to clear the measure through the Rules Committee, a procedure they believe would take two or three days and might be televised, according to sources close to the leadership.

All major legislation is sent to the Rules Committee to be given a procedural rule and a time limitation for House debate. While technically the committee could block an impeachment resolution, it could do so only temporarily, and it

is considered highly unlikely that it would block a matter of such importance.

The leadership goal is to get the resolution to the House by Aug. 12, with a final vote by Aug. 23, but this involves finding a way to give all 435 House members a chance to speak or offer amendments.

One possible procedure being considered is to ask for an "open rule," meaning one under which amendments can be offered, with unlimited debate time but authorization for Mr. Rodino and Representative Edward Hutchinson of Michigan, the senior Republican on the Judiciary Committee, to end the formal debate and start voting at their discretion.

Another possibility Mr. Rodino has discussed is a rule limiting debate to 100 hours, which would take from 10 days to two weeks, depending on the House schedule. There is a tentative plan to schedule House sessions from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M. daily, Monday through Saturday, until action is completed.

No decision has yet been made on whether to allow television coverage of the House debate.
