Gesturing to the plane he had renamed the Spirit of '76, he asked to crowd to remember what it was named

"America came into the world 200 years ago for the purpose of making the whole world a peaceful world," he said. "Over the past five years we are proud we have brought the whole world closer to the dream of peace

"I am going to continue to work for peace among all nations . . . And we are going to continue to be very proud of the fact that we, like you, are Californians and we are now home we are now home again."

Mr. Nixon was accompanied on the flight home by his wife Pat, his daughter and son-in-law, Tricia and Edward Cox, and several staff members.

The former President and Mrs. Nixon stepped from the plane first, smiling and waving to the crowd that had created a traffic jam in the vicinity of the air station.

They were greeted by base officials before Mr. Nixon stepped to a microphone for brief extemporaneous remarks.

"Hi," he began, smiled and broke into laughter as the crowd cheered and waved American flags. At the conclusion of his remarks and as the party moved to depart for the Nixon home at San Clemente, the crowd of over 5000 sang, "God Bless America."

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
