Nixon Said to Have Barred
Any Bargains for Immunity

BALTIMORE, Aug. 14 (AP)— Before he resigned as President last week, Richard M. Nixon ordered his aides not to seek any deals preventing his future prosecution, The Baltimore Sun said today.

Quoting what it called authoritative sources, The Sun said that Mr. Nixon ordered his key aides, even before his final decision to resign, to make no approaches to Congress for lenient treatment.

The paper also said it had been told that the subject of immunity for Nixon was not discussed when the White House chief of staff, Gen Alexander M. Haig Jr., visited the special prosecutor, Leon Jaworski, shortly after the then Vice President Ford was informed of Mr. Nixon's decision. General Haig has refused to discuss his conversation with Mr. Jaworski. Mr. Jaworski has said that no deal was made or requested regarding immunity.
