Rep. David Treen of Metairie, La., the only Republican elected to Congress from Louisiana in this century and an avid Nixon Loyalist, said Wednesday he asked Water-gate Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski not to press charges against the former President.

"I am not saying that Richard Nixon is above the law," Treen said in a letter to Jaworski. "I quite agree that no one is above the law." But he said, "Prosecutive action against the former President action would be extremely divisive and counter-productive in unifying our country.
