In the latest nationwide survey, a majority of 56 per cent think former President Nixon should be tried for possible criminal charges arising from Watergate while 37 per cent oppose such action and 7 per cent do not express an opinion.

As in the case of many

Watergate-related issues in the past views on this issue are strongly partisan from a political standpoint. Democrats are nearly 3-to-1 in favor of bringing Mr. Nixon to trial, but Republicans are nearly 2-to-1 opposed.

Mr. Nixon was named as an unindicted co-conspirator by the grand jury that formally accused many of his associates and aides of Wat-

ergate-related crimes. And since he resigned from the presidency, forfeiting what immunity may have protected him in that office, there has been a great deal of speculation over whether or not he should be indicted and prosecuted.
