## Ehrlichman's New Demand

Washington

John D. Ehrlichman, who already has subpoenaed former President Nixon to testify at the Watergate coverup trial, now has demanded that the Secret Service surrender hundreds of Nixonera documents still locked in White House vaults.

A subpoena issued August 29 and made public late yesterday orders the papers be delivered in U.S. District Court September 16.

A spokesman for the Secret Service said the subpoena was received yesterday afternoon.

Although the Secret Service is in charge of safe-keeping of Mr. Nixon's tapes and files, it is unclear who has legal custody.

Ehrlichman, one of six men scheduled to go on trial September 30 in the coverup case, demanded that Secret Service Director H. S. Knight come to court and bring with him vast numbers of papers from the peri-

od of June 17, 1972, through May 1, 1973.

June 17 was the day five men were arrested with bugging gear at the Watergate offices of the Democratic National Committee and May 1 was the day after a major upheaval in the White House staff in the wake of scandal — including the resignation of Ehrlichman and H. R. Haldeman and the firing of John W. Dean III.

For that period, Ehrlichman asked for:

- His notes of meetings with Mr. Nixon, "which are stored in reddish-brown binders."
- A chronological file of his correspondence.
- All his personal papers relating to the Watergate burglary and the intelligence-gathering operation of the Nixon campaign that led to it, the activities of political saboteur Donald J. Segretti, the investigation of the "Watergate affair" and Mr. Nixon's taped conversa-

## Increase in Fee for Getting Passport OKd

The Senate passed and sent to the White House yesterday a bill to permit an increase in the \$2 fee collected for executing passport applications at certain post offices and federal courts.

The bill would permit the secretary of state to prescribe the amount of the execution fee annually in an amount sufficient to offset handling costs. There would be no change in the separate \$10 passport fee.
