

"Serious consideration was given to hospitalization, but it has been ruled out at this time based on former President Nixon's wishes.

"The former President will continue to receive medication and will be under doctor's care, and an evaluation will be made on a weekly basis by Dr. Lundgren and myself."

Dr. John Lundgren is a Long Beach internist with a specialty in cardiology who has been the Nixons' family doctor for many years. Tkach said he had examined Mr. Nixon yesterday morning after arriving here from Washington and had consulted with Lundgren, who examined the former President Tuesday in Palm Springs.  $10 \leq EP$ 

Lundgren also was not available to newsmen.

A Washington source said the purpose of Tkach's trip was to "determine on the scene whether he (Nixon) should hospitalized."

Mr. Nixon's son-in-law, David Eisenhower, said Thursday that the blood clot had moved above the knee and caused Mr. Nixon's leg to swell twice its normal size.

Mr. Nixon and his wife, Pat, returned to San Clemente by helicopter Thursday night after a five-day stay at the Palm Springs estate of
