

U.S. WILL NOT SEEK TRIAL FOR JACOBSEN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)

—Despite the refusal of a Federal judge to agree, the Justice Department says it will keep its word and will not prosecute Jake Jacobsen, a former attorney for the Associated Milk Producers, Inc., on charges of misapplication of funds of a savings and loan association.

A move to drop the charges was rejected last Friday by Judge Robert M. Hill of United States District Court in Dallas, who said justice would not be served.

But the Justice Department said yesterday that it would not prosecute the savings and loan case against Mr. Jacobsen, a move agreed to in return for his guilty plea to a bribery charge and testimony against former Treasury Secretary John B. Connally.

"This motion was made pursuant to a plea-bargain agreement entered into in good faith by the United States," the department said. "The Government must fulfill its part of the plea bargain, and therefore cannot go forward with the prosecution of the defendant Jacobsen in this case."
