Julie Nixon Eisenhower said yesterday that her father will probably enter a hospital within a week for treatment of his phlebitis.

She said the former President is getting better and that he is "just going to get some things checked.

Mrs. Eisenhower termed "crazy" reports that her father's mind is wandering vand said: "I think he is doing very well under the "circumstances."

58 She commented to newsmen after taping five shows of the NBC-produced pro-gram, "Not for Women gram, "Not for Women Only." The segments will be broadcast in two weeks:

"Of course, he's not on top of the world," she said of her father. She said that nation's highest office her father felt that "you've done all you can for your coun-try;" and, she added, "It's a letdown when you leave."

She quoted her mother as saying Mr. Nixon is "irritable" as a result of his illness but that she is han-dling the situation "very well."

Mrs. Eisenhower added that her parents are not reading newspapers.

She categorically denied that she had been a source of information about her father's health to General Alexander Haig. outgoing White House chief of staff.

Asked about President Ford's pardon of her father last week, she said, "I think he made the wise decision, while under the strain of the the right decision ... I'm

not going to reiterate what Ford said. I think he said it all."

Mr. Nixon had admitted guilt, Mrs. Eisenhower re-plied: "I'm not going to get into that question at all."
