Montoya Says Rate Of U.S. Aid to Nixon Is \$2-Million a Year

NYTIMES OCT 9 1974 The Washington Star-News WASHINGTON, Oct. 8—The Federal Government is now spending at the rate of almost \$2-million a year on personnel and support services for former President Richard M. Nixon, ac-cording to Senator Joseph M. Montoya, Democrat of New Mexico.

Montoya, Democrat of New Mexico. Mr. Montoya said that the new spending figures released today had been provided by the White House at his request. They do not include a special "transitional allowance for Mr. Nixon pending before the Senate.

Senate. Congress is expected to set that allowance at \$200,000— less than a quarter of the \$850,000 that President Ford has requested for his predecessor. Mr. Montoya, chairman of the Senate Appropriations sub-committee, which has been scrutinizing Federal outlays for the former President, said that information supplied by the White House showed the fol-lowing: Sixty-four Government em-

The Senator said that 18 per-sons were at San Clemente working directly on Mr. Nixon's transition to private life. Their salaries total some \$375,000 a year, he said. The costs described by Mr. Montoya do not include general operating expenses apart from salaries or the costs of special jet flights from Washington to San Clemente for transporting national-security briefing papers to Mr. Nixon, to Mr. Nixon,
