

House Report on Job Held

Washington.

A House manpower subcommittee investigation has concluded that a son of Chief Justice Warren E. Burger was hired for a government job on the basis of preferential treatment, a subcom-

mittee spokesman said yesterday.

The spokesman, Paul Newton, assistant staff director of the subcommittee, said in an interview that Representative David Henderson (Dem-N.C.), the sub-

committee chairman, plans to recommend that Wade Burger's appointment to a position in the General Services Administration be terminated.

Newton said Henderson will recommend that Burg-

er's employment "be continued only if he can be legally appointed in a manner consistent with merit system requirements."

The subcommittee report was made several months after the Civil Service Com-

mission ruled that despite the fact that Burger was improperly given the job he could keep it because there wasn't enough evidence to take disciplinary action against him.
