**Greyhound Is Fined
\$5,000 for '72 Gifts
In Presidential Race**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (UPI) — The Greyhound Corporation was fined \$5,000 today for making illegal corporate campaign contributions to the 1972 Presidential campaigns of President Nixon and Senator George S. McGovern, Democrat of South Dakota.

Greyhound, which pleaded guilty to the charge earlier this month, was accused of making payments totaling \$16,040 to various political committees organized on behalf of Mr. Nixon and Mr. McGovern.

The \$5,000 fine, imposed by United States District Judge Oliver Gasch, was the maximum that could be levied under a Federal law that prohibits political contributions or expenditures by national banks, corporations or labor organizations.

Greyhound was the 16th company to plead guilty or be convicted of a felony or misdemeanor in connection with illegal contributions in 1972.

Leon Jaworski, who stepped down as special Watergate prosecutor last Friday, said in information filed earlier with the court that Greyhound had made the illegal contributions through its senior officers.

The prosecutor said that the senior officers had been encouraged to contribute personal funds to the Presidential candidate of their choice, and the company then gave a "bonus" to each executive who made the contribution.

The cash bonuses were double the amount of the political contribution, the information said.
