

**DRUG THERAPY SEEN
AS LIKELY FOR NIXON**

LONG BEACH, Calif., Nov. 10 (AP) — Former President Richard M. Nixon "presumably" resumed anticoagulation therapy this weekend for the first time since he went into shock after surgery for phlebitis on Oct. 29, a hospital spokesman said today.

8 NOV Mr. Nixon's doctors reported Friday that he had entered an "in-hospital recovery" period and that the blood-thinning drug therapy would probably be resumed this weekend.

Norman Nager, spokesman for Memorial Hospital Medical Center, said this "presumably"

had been done, but he had no confirmation from Mr. Nixon's physician, Dr. John C. Lungren.

Dr. Lungren was unavailable over the weekend, and the next report on the former President's health was scheduled for tomorrow morning.
