Two in Agnew Case Plead Guilty

Two men who figured in the probe of former Vice-President Spiro T. Agnew pleaded guilty to tax charges yesterday.


I. H. Hammerman II. a mortgage banker, and Allen I. Green, an engineer, pleaded guilty before a threejudge panel. Sentencing was scheduled for November 25.

George Beall, U.S. Attorney for Maryland and the leader of the federal probe of Maryland political corruption, said later that he recommended that the two men not be given jail terms.

Hammerman and Allen's guilty pleas and Beall's recommendation are reported to have worked out in return for the men's cooperation with the probe.

Hammerman is charged with collecting money from several individuals for Agnew.

According to court documents, he received cash from consultants between

Jan. 25, 1967, and Jan. 7, 1969, giving it to Agnew, then Maryland's governor, and Jerome B. Wolff, then chairman of the State Roads Commission.

Green, a consulting engineer, is charged with making his payments directly to Agnew. He told prosecutors he paid Agnew approximately \$50,000 between 1966 and 1972, according to court papers. Green said he continued his payments after Agnew became vice president.

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
