TAPE PACT OPPOSED

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BY NIXON'S LAWYERS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14

(Reuters) — Former President
Richard M. Nixon's lawyers today asked a Federal court to
block Watergate prosecutors
from conducting a "freewheeling rummage" through his personal files.

Herbert J. Miller Jr., Mr.
Nixon's Washington lawyer,
asked for a temporary restraining order to stop the special
prosecutor, Henry S. Ruth Jr.,
from going through the former
President's White House tapes
and files without authorization
from a court or Mr. Nixon.

The request was prompted by
a Nov. 9 agreement between the
special prosecutor and President
Ford's lawyers giving Watergate investigators the right to
search Presidential materials
and copy any tapes or documents they determine might be
needed for criminal proceedings.

Mr. Miller argued that the agreement "is a flagrant intrusion on Mr. Nixon's rights both as a citizen and as former President of the United States."
