WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—

A former convict who helped organize a national prison reform group has filed suit challenging the constitutionality of Federal pardon regulations.

C. Edward Lawrenson, executive director of the National Association for Justice, asked a Federal court to overturn the Justice Department rules determing which convicts are eligible for Presidential pardons.

The rules say that no individual will be considered for a pardon until at least three years after his release from prison, or three years after the date of conviction if no prison sentence was imposed.

Mr. Lawrenson's attorneys cited President Ford's unconditional pardon of former President Richard M. Nixon as evidence that the regulations are unfair because they are not applied to every case.

Mr. Ford pardoned Mr. Nixon for all crimes he may have committed while he was President even though he had not been charged, tried and convicted of a crime. The pardon was granted while Watergate Prosecutors were considering whether to bring charges against Mr. Nixon for his role in the Watergate cover-up'
