Firestone said that the foundation "had not solicited donaday when the Nixon Founda-tion—set up to organize the project—dissolved itself. funds are involved in the funds are involved in the transfer."

The fund was established in 1969 to ensure the suitable preservation of the papers and memorabilia of the Nixon presidency.

Firestone said that "the ma-jority of the board feel that the present circumstances militate against carrying out the purposes of the foundation at this time."

However, he added that the Whittier College trustees and other interested parties "may at a later date decide what can be done to preserve the record of six eventful years in Ameri-
