

Colson Stripped of Virginia Law License

The Virginia Supreme Court yesterday revoked the law license of former White House adviser Charles W. Colson.

The Court, in a one-sentence order, agreed with the Virginia Bar Association, which had brought proceedings against Colson after he was sentenced to one to three years in prison and fined \$5,000 for violating the rights of Daniel Ellsberg following publication of the Pentagon papers.

Colson has been suspended indefinitely from practicing law in Massachusetts and has been disbarred in the District of Columbia.
