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Liddy Set To Return To Prison

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G. Gordon Liddy, who already has served longer in jail than any Watergate defendant, told U.S. District Court Judge George L. Hart Jr. yesterday he will surrender Wednesday at the federal prison at Danbury, Conn.

In a brief courtroom appearance, Liddy signed a personal guarantee that he would submit valuations to save the submit valuations. mit voluntarily to serve the re-mainder of a term of 6 years, mainder of a term of 6 years, 8 months to 20 years for masterminding the 1972 Watergate bugging. He has been free pending outcome of an appeal, which was turned down by the Supreme Court.

Liddy's total time of 21 months already served in prison is twice as long as any Watergate defendant.

Liddy, a former FBI agent who was finance counsel for President Nixon's re-election committee, has been given three separate prison sentences.

U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica gave Liddy the sentence of up to 20 years for the bugging, and when he refused to testify before the grand jury, the judge sentenced him to serve 18 months for contempt of court.

Last July, Liddy was sentenced to serve one to three years concurrently for his part in the 1971 break in at the of-fice of Pentagon papers de-fendant Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Liddy's contempt sentence ended last September. He was released Oct. 15 pending the outcome of his Watergate appeal, so he actually has served only about one month for the bugging.
