## Ziegler Reinvited to Speak But Offer Is Cut to $\$ 1,000$

University President John $R$. Silber issued a statement offering Ziegler the school's standard maximum speaker's fee of $\$ 1,000$ plus expenses, not the $\$ 2,500$ he was origi nally offered.
"Since the withdrawal of the invitation has received national publicity that has distorted the university's position on free speech, I am acting to remove any doubts about that commitment," Silber said.
