

Jaworski Praises Americans' Action In Watergate Case

Leon Jaworski, former Watergate special prosecutor, says that if the American people had not demanded action in the Watergate scandal it might have grown into outrages as great as those in Nazi Germany.

Mr. Jaworski drew the parallel in remarks made at a dinner Wednesday night of the lawyers division of the United Jewish Appeal and the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies joint campaign held at the New York Hilton Hotel.

The event was in honor of Senator Jacob K. Javits, who was presented with the annual Joseph M. Proskauer Award, a plaque, in recognition of his work in behalf of civil and human rights.

Referring to Watergate, Mr. Jaworski said that "in those trying and tragic days, the institutions of our government discharged their responsibilities."

"The American people," Mr. Jaworski said, "insisted that constitutional action be taken, and there was sufficient leadership to respond in places where action was needed."

Citing the need for people to speak out, Mr. Jaworski said that "we need be no more retrospective than to review the disastrous experience of Nazi Germany."
