

Dean Gets \$11,000

For Three Speeches

At Colleges Here

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After three somewhat contentious but remunerative speaking engagements in and around New York City, John W. Dean 3d, a Watergate conspirator, checked out of the Warwick Hotel yesterday and headed for Kutztown, Pa.

Mr. Dean, who made a total of \$11,000 for speeches during the preceding two days at St. John's University in Queens, at Westchester Community College in Valhalla, N.Y., and at Montclair (N.J.) State College, was reported to be receiving about \$3,500 for last night's address.

The site was Kutztown State College, with an enrollment of about 5,000 undergraduate and graduate students, and, more precisely, the college's fieldhouse, Keystone Hall, with a capacity of 4,500 people.

Dr. Lawrence W. Stratton, the college's president, said there had been no organized protests against the appearance of the former White House counsel, although objections

had been voiced by some students.

Mr. Dean's appearance in and around New York were marked by a bomb threat that forced the audience to leave the Westchester Community College gymnasium temporarily, by pickets at St. John's who chanted "Crime does pay," and by objections from some members of his audiences to the large sums of money he is receiving as a result of his involvement in the Watergate scandal.

Mr. Dean was released from prison in January after having served four months of a prison term of one to four years imposed after he pleaded guilty to one count of conspiring to obstruct justice.

He began a scheduled six-week lecture tour on Feb. 2. The appearances are expected to bring him \$100,000.

Carl Novotny, a vice president of the American Program Bureau, a lecture bureau representing about 400 speakers—among them, Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward, reporters for The Washington Post who played a large role in uncovering the Watergate scandal—said he understood that Mr. Dean had usually been drawing capacity crowds.
