

# Court Bars Morgan

Edward Morgan, the former Treasury Department official who pleaded guilty to falsifying Richard M. Nixon's tax returns, was barred yesterday from practicing law before the Supreme Court.

The court ordered Morgan's name stricken from its list.

Morgan served four months of a two-year jail sentence and was released in April after pleading guilty in November, 1974, to one count of conspiracy to obstruct the Internal Revenue Service in a case in-

volving the former President's back-dating of more than 500,000 worth of vice presidential papers to take advantage of a tax law on gifts.

He is the third Watergate-related figure to be barred from practicing before the Supreme Court. The others are G. Gordon Liddy, who masterminded the June 17, 1972 Watergate break-in, and former White House aide John W. Dean III, Nixon's chief accuser in the Watergate scandal.
