House Panel, Ruth to Meet On Watergate

Watergate Special Prosecutor Henry S. Ruth Jr. will meet with the House Criminal Justice Subcommittee for a discussion of the Watergate in restigation and the final report, Chairman William L. Hungate (D-Mo.), said Thursday. day. 16 for an opportunity to question Ruth, and Hungate

said the prosecutor agreed readily: "He has been most co-operative." No date has been

The third and final Watergate grand jury has now been dismissed, and Ruth goes out of office in about two months.

Hungate said it is important that there be no hint of a cover-up and the subcommittee wants to give Ruth its views on the writing of the report—a wrapup of the long Watergate investigation.

"The fact that Mr. Nixon resigned and there was no im-

signed and there was no im-peachment trial where more information might have been developed is a factor,' Hungate said. "I have no reason to believe Mr. Ruth has not done everything a consci-entious man should do." Hungate said the subcom-

mittee plans to question Ruth behind closed doors to safe-guard sensitive information and avoid damage to persons who might have been named in evidence but not indicted.

The subcommittee questions, he said, will be directed o the thoroughness of the inestigation, the nature of the eport and the ultimate dispo-ition of the documents and ther evidence gathered by he grand jury.
