From Notes on People:

The Nebraska Supreme Court yesterday suspended **G. Bradford Cook**, former chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, from the practice of law in Nebraska for three years because of his false testimony before Congressional subcommittees and a Federal grand jury.

Mr. Cook has conceded his perjury, which was in connection with the S.E.C. investigation of **Robert C. Vesco**, the financier and Nixon campaign contributor. Mr. Cook later was a prosecution witness in the trial here of John N. Mitchell and Maurice H. Stans. The Nebraska Supreme Court said Mr. Cook's "admitted perjury may well

have affected his creditibility" as a witness in the trial, and as a consequence, the administration of justice."

The Supreme Court rejected the recommendation that Mr. Cook be censured, a penalty the court decided was too light.
