

## To Jamaica Dies at 49

Special to The Washington Post Special to The Washington Post FALMOUTH, Maine, Aug. 12 Vincent DeRoulet, 49, former U.S. ambassador to Jamaica died Sunday of a heart attack at the home of his mother-in-law Joan Whitney Payson, owner of the New York Mets baseball team. He lived in Manhasset, N.Y. Mr DeRoulet served as am-

Mr. DeRoulet served as am-bassador from 1969 until July, 1975, when he was declared persona non grata by Prime Minister Michael Manley.

Manley sought Mr. De-Roulet's removal after testi-mony before a congressional committee that DeRoulet promised Manley the United States would not become in-volved in the 1972 Jamaica elections if Manley did not make an issue of the nationali-zation of American bauxite in-terests on the island. terests on the island.

While serving as ambassa-dor to Jamaica Mr. DeRoulet gave a donation of \$100,500 to the Nixon re-election committhe Mixon re-election commit-tee and received assurances of a more prestigious post ac-cording to a report by the House Judiciary Committee in July, 1974. However, he never received the appointment.

received the appointment. Mr. DeRoulet was in the 5th Air Force in the Pacific dur-ing World War II and subse-quently became president of Towne-Oiler Associates, a mar-keting firm. He also was a di-rector. of the Meadowbrook National Bank on Long Island. Surviving are his wife, the former Lorinda Payson; a son, Daniel, two daughters Whit-ney and Debe; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry DeRoulet, of Los Angles; and a sister, Mrs. Warren Williamson, of New York.
