

A Second U.S. Plan on Chile is Cited

Proposals to Use Military and Diplomatic Pressure
To Block Allende Reported

Washington, Aug. 12 -

The Senate Select Committee on Intelligence ... is attempting to obtain documents, tapes and other materials from Presidential papers of Richard M. Nixon ... covering events between Sept. 4 and Nov. 3, 1970.

[A] subpoena requests any materials relating to a series of meetings between Mr. Nixon and Henry A. Kissinger, who was then his adviser on national security affairs, and various officials of the State Department, Department of Defense and Central Intelligence Agency.

The papers are not in Mr. Nixon's custody. Congress enacted a law stating that the papers, tapes and other materials accumulated by the President while he was in the White House were the property of the people. Mr. Nixon is contesting this in court. Meanwhile, custody is temporarily held by the White House.

The subpoena was directed to Philip Buchen, counsel to the President, and Arthur Sampson, director of the General Services Administration, who has temporary custody.
