WXPost AUG 2 6 1975 Buchen Says He'll Supply Nixon Data

Presidential counsel Philip W. Buchen told a federal court yesterday he plans to comply with a Senate intelligence committee subpoena for certain documents compiled during the Nixon administration unless the court rules that he cannot do so.

Buchen's plans we're described in a motion filed by the Justice Department in U.S. District Court.

The committee has subpoenaed former President Nixon's files concerning efforts to prevent Marxist Salvador Allende from becoming president of Chile in 1970. The committee subpoena also seeks the files kept by Nixon and his aides about the so-called Huston Plan to launch domestic intelligence operations.

The committee subpoena stated that the materials should have been turned over by yesterday, but Buchen and Justice Department lawyers questioned whether an existing court order prevented them from doing so.

The District Court previously ordered that all of Nixon's tapes recordings and documents be impounded pending a decision on whether they are owned by the government or Nixon.

The former President claims ownership and argues that Buchen does not have the right to inspect or disclose the material to comply with congressional inquiries.
