

Nixon Committee Has \$1.5 Million

Former President Nixon's 1972 campaign committee reported yesterday it still has more than \$1.5 million on hand.

The campaign liquidation trust set up to handle the remaining balance said in a report filed with the Federal Election Commission that in recent months it had paid only \$41,000 of numerous demands made by a score of persons and companies.

The largest claim was from the law firm which represented

former Attorney General John Mitchell in his New York court case involving an illegal campaign contribution.

Mitchell's lawyers have already received \$200,000 from the committee in that case and have billed it for a balance of \$271,390.

Former Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans sought nearly \$150,000 for various items.

The report showed the trustees of the campaign fund had not paid any of the major demands by Stans, but had paid him \$3675 for professional services regarding

tax matters.

Kenneth Wells Parkinson, former lawyer for the Nixon campaign committee who was acquitted in the Watergate cover-up trial, asked the committee to pay his \$73,393 bill for legal fees and expenses.
