Cardinal Cooke Gets 2 Aides

In his capacity as vicar to the American armed services, Terence Cardinal Cooke has been given two new aides to serve here by appointment of Pope Paul VI. The apostolic delegate to the United States, Archbishop Joseph T. Ryan of Anchorage as coadjutor archbishop to the Cardinal and Navy chaplain James J. Willen, now a monsignor, as auxiliary bishop. They will serve at the 1011 First Avenue headquarters of the Military Ordinariate, which also serves personnel and dependents of reserve units and at veterans' hospitals.

Both appointees graduated from St. Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers. Archbishop Ryan, aged 62, was born in Albany and graduated from Manhattan College and was a Marine Corps chaplain in World War II. Monsignor Killeen, born here in 1917, attended St. Jerome's elementary school in the Bronx and Cathedral College, and served St. Mar's Church in Yonkers. A 24-year Navy man, he served at many overseas stations and as chaplain at the Naval Academy and taught courses at the Bureau of Personnel in Washington.

In Kiev, the Ukrainian capital, 800 African students ended a week-long classroom strike on behalf of Alena

Grulichova, a 23-year-old Czechoslovak who was ordered home one year short of her philosophy degree. The students, charging that her recall was the result of her marriage to 29-year-old Udo Ubam of Nigeria, demonstrated at the Czechoslovak consulate but ended their protest when they were assured that Mrs. Ubam would be allowed to stay. In Lvov the African Students Union sent complaints to 10 African embassies in Moscow charging interference by Soviet and university officials and alleging attacks on Africans by Soviet citizens.

Catherine Shaw, 62-year-old wife of the Australian Ambassador, Sir Patrick Shaw, was found lying on the sidewalk late Monday afternoon by the security patrol for Washington's Embassy Row. An assailant had knocked her unconscious and stolen her purse. She was admitted to Georgetown University Hospital in shock, with a broken hand and facial lacerations.

Rabbi Baruch Korff envisions a new "day of atonement" that the nation will someday create "to atone for its sins against Richard Nixon and his Administration." The fund-raiser for the former President told a Cincinnati audience that, to prevent "a long line of conservative Republican Presidents," Mr. Nixon was done in by news media and liberals. "To assassinate him would be to make a martyr," Rabbi Korff said, "so they had to destroy him body and soul."

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
