Doris Kearns, one-time confidante of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson, and former Presidential advisor Richard Goodwin, were married Sunday—by both a priest and a rabbi—at the 200-year-old home of the groom in Lincoln, Mass.

The guest list included many of both the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations which Goodwin served, too. Among the guests were Arthur Schlesinger, Lawrence O'Brien, writer Norman Mailer, Boston Mayor Kevin H. White, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, Rolling Stone publisher Jann Wenner and former Nixon defense attorney James St. Clair.

The couple became involved in a literary controversy when Kearns contracted to write a book about LBJ for Basic Books Publishing firm. Later she and Goodwin said they would write a different book

on Johnson and got a \$100,000 advance from Simon and Schuster. Later Goodwin dropped out of the project. Both now teach at Harvard.

Saying that he didn't believe that Richard Nixon knew he was "actually breaking the law," evangelist Billy Graham advised the former president to purge himself of personal misconduct by revealing the "total truth" in his upcoming book.

Graham said he was "shocked and surprised" by the Watergate tapes. "I really believed in him but I didn't know all that stuff was on tape. This was a Nixon I didn't know," Graham said.

Graham said that he and the

former president are once again close friends, after a year's loss of contact. Graham says he respects his friend's ability to bear the disgrace and likened Nixon and Watergate to Lyndon Johnson's entrapment in the Vietnam war.

Seven other cast members, director Milos Forman and producers Michael Douglas and Saul Zaentz were also on hand. Douglas is the one who

Louise Fletcher, who plays Nurse Ratched in the film, was accompanied by a flock of other Fletchers. Her brother John is the president of Inter-Met, the local seminary which reaped \$50,000 from Sunday's screening.
