OTTAWA, Oct. 15 - The private table talk of Henry A Kissinger reveals that the Secretary of State found former President Richard M. Nixon to be an "odd, ar tificial and unpleasant man."

Kissinger made the comments at a private state banquet held in his honor Tuesday night by Canadian External Affairs Minister Allan MacEachen.

Kissinger's comments were picked up by a microphone that was used to transmit his after dinner toast to reporters, who were not invited to the banquet. But the sound system was turned on throughout the six-course meal, making reporters privy to Kissinger's intimate table chat.

Kissinger had nice words for the Kennedy family, especially Jacqueline Onassis whom he said he likes and inds "sexy."

"Jackie is a hard woman who knows what she wants," Kissinger said.

"In the sense that when he met somebody, he thought it out very carefully, so nothing was spontaneous. He didn't enjoy meeting people and people sensed it. And that made them uncomfortable. "What I have never un-

Kissinger also said that Nixon could never win over the hearts of Americans because he came across so poorly on television.
