Nixon, Busy on Book, Will Skip '76 Politics

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SAN CLEMENTE, Calif., Jan. 11 (AP)-Former President Nixon has decided to concentrate on "working on the book" rather than enter the political arena during this presidential election year, say fellow members of the Lincoln Club of Orange County.

I got the impression that he (Nixon) probably felt it was wrong to get involved in politics at this time," <u>Robert</u> <u>Beaver</u>, treasurer of the conservative club, which has long supported Nixon, said

from some Republicans that it would be better if Nixon, who resigned the presidency in the wake of the Watergate scandals, didn't become in-volved in the 1976 campaigns. Nixon invited about 20 members of the club over to his seaside villa on Dec. 13. He joined the club by writing a personal check for the \$500-a-year dues but told his break-fast guests he didn't plan to attend club meetings. Dues attend club meetings. as donations for GOP candidates supported by the club. Nixon reportedly ritold another club member that because of his desire to complete the manuscript he planned no extended vacations.

In his agreement last August to tape four 90-minute shows with television per-sonality David Frost, Nixon said the shows were to be broadcast after November, 1976, because, according to Frost, "the former President does not wish to appear to intervene in the 1976 elec-tions."
