

Less than eight months after he entered prison, con-victed for perjury in a Water-gate case, Dwight L. Chapin will be paroled April 2 from the minimum-security Fed-eral prison in Lompoc, Calif. Top-level officials of the Fed-eral Parole Board announced yesterday that it would pa-role Mr. Chapin, a former ap-pointments secretary under President Nixon. Mr. Chapin, now 35 years

President Nixon. Mr. Chapin, now 35 years old, was first sentenced to up to 30 months in prison for denying to the Water-gate grand jury that he had instructed Donald H. Segret-ti to direct a campaign of po-litical espionage and sabo-tage against Democratio Presidential aspirants in 1972. Mr. Segretti a former 1972. Mr. Segretti, a former Treasury Department law-yer, was convicted for his part in the political espionage part in the political espionage campaign and served time in Federal prison. Mr. Chapin entered prison last Aug. 11. In a letter to Judge Ger-hard A. Gesell of Federal District Court in Washing-ton, who reduced the orig-inal sentence last December and urged parole "as soon as possible," Mr. Chapin said he had accepted the punishment "with a keen sense of awareness that I would not be here if, in-deed, I had not done some-thing wrong."
