

# Segretti Suspended From Bar

California's state Supreme Court suspended **Donald H. Segretti** from law practice in the state for two years yesterday, rejecting his contention that his political tricks during the Nixon re-election campaign in 1972 did not involve moral turpitude. The court order, originally calling for a five-year suspension, was modified and Mr. Segretti was put on probation for the final three years. He was also ordered to pass the state bar's professional-responsibility examination before resuming law practice.

Mr. Segretti, 34 years old, is still on Federal probation after serving six months of a two-year prison sentence. He pleaded guilty to conspiracy and illegal distribution of political literature, including issuing false statements on a campaign stationery of rival candidates. The court ruled that his "acts of deceit [were] designed to subvert the free electoral process."
