Local Announcer: President Ford has a close brush with what could have left him and his campaign strategists with fed faces. Fred Graham explains:

Graham (CBS network feed): The House Judiciary Subcommittee that questioned President Ford under oath about the Nixon pardon in 1974 met again today before the full glare of television lights to take a vote that could have resulted in a highly publicized reopening of the sensitive Nixon pardon issue just at a time when it could have embarrassed President Ford in his re-election [sic] campaign. Congressmoman Elizabeth Holtzmann of New York, a Democrat, made a motion to investigate charges published in the Washington Post* that former White House aide Elexander Haig had lobbied Mr. Ford to the pardon, and that the President was told Mr. Nixon might commit suicide if he were not pardoned. Representatime Charles Wiggins, a Republican, cried "politics" and accused the Democrats of flogging a dead horse. But when the vote was taken, two Democrats, Martin Russo of Illinois and Mames Mann of South Carolina, lined up with the committee's two Republicans, and the effort to reopen the pardon issue failed, four to three.
