Radio Free Europe Gets New Director

The new director of Radio Free Europe is Albert E. Hemsing, a former filmmaker for clothing and textile unions here and teacher of film technique at City College. He has been at the American embassy in New Delhi since he was brought in by Daniel P. Moynihan, then ambassador, to head the United States Information Service there in 1973. Mr. Hemsing, who has resigned from the Foreign Service after 18 years, succeeds Ralph E. Walter, who will be programming vice president of Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, which broadcasts to the Soviet Union. Mr. Hemsing is a 1942 City College graduate with a master's degree from New York University. From 1951-55 he directed films in Europe for the Marshall Plan.

In a visit clearly designed to make a point, Gen. Alexander M. Haig became yesterday the highest placed Western military officer known to have crossed the Berlin Wall since it was built by the Communists in 1961.
