A San Francisco man asked [no date] the U.S. Attorney General's office in San Francisco to investigate the legality of former President Richard Nixon's Chinese-sponsored trip to Peking.

In the document, signed by a notary public and filed with the federal office, James Meyer [phonetic] asked for an investigation of the U.S. State Department and of Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, for aiding in the journey. Meyer asserted that Nixon obviously intervened in foreign affairs. He also questioned the allowance made for an aircraft of Chinese registry to land in California to transport Nixon to Peking.

"Inasmuch as Mr. Kissinger's office is involved, possibly not directly, I feel a determination must be made as to whether or not he is guilty of malfeasance or misfeasance while in office, a violation of the oath of office as specified in the Constitution," says gold old James Meyer, who has asked for an investigation into Nixon's trip.
