White House Lauds Nixon China Report

President Ford found a re-port by former President Nixon on his recent trip to China "very interesting and useful," the White House said yesterday.

The 60-page report has been returned to Nixon's San Clemente home at his request with only four men in the government having read it and without any copies having been made, presi-dential press secretary Ron Nessen said.
